One of the suggestions made was to have the larger clubs or groups of smaller clubs host an evening during Can-At '98.

Another suggestion was that we have a Cape Breton night, a Newfoundland night, a New Brunswick night, etc. hosted by clubs from these areas.

Another suggestion is to have a Unit-wide game (both units) to support Can-At '98 with overall winners getting free Can-At entries.

Initiatives such as these can keep Can-At costs to a minimum.

Fund-raising is always a headache but is a must for Can-At 98. It appears at this point that we must raise approximately five thousand dollars to cover Can-At costs in 1998.

There are plans for two more Calcuttas during the next year. The first is one planned for the fall. It would be open only to players with less

than one thousand master points as of January 1, 1997. The second Calcutta would be an Open event in the spring of 1998.

Can-At '98 committees are in the process of being formed. We need all the help that we can get. If you cannot actively participate, we would still like your ideas and suggestions.





From the given information, the ratio of the distances covered by Frank, Sam and Tom, in that order is 10:8:6. Since the speeds remain constant the ratio of the speeds remains constant, so that, when Sam completes an additional 2 miles, Tom completes an additional x miles with

2/x = 8/6, x = 3/2.

Therefore, when Sam completes 10 miles, Tom completes 7 1/2 miles; that is, Sam beats Tom by 2 1/2 miles.
