Success At Bridge -- Part 4

by Jon Shute

By now, the particularly astute reader will have ascertained that Success at Bridge depends upon following two rules — 1. Be polite. 2. Have fun. 95% of us (I like to humor myself as being in the top 95% of players) already followed these rules, but seeing examples from star players may have reinforced our commitment. We can now move on to refining our Success by adding a third, non-bolded rule: 3. Be actively ethical.

"Actively ethical" means that some knowledge and effort is required. One must <u>strive</u> to be actively ethical. This is not something reserved for National Champions or tournament players. Being known as an actively ethical player is within the grasp of all of us, including in our club games. (This means our weekly duplicate games, it does NOT mean contracts of 5 Clubs.)

I assume you already know that you may not pretend to hold a card that you don't have. For example, if you hold a singleton in the suit led you may **not** pause for undue thought, fish around with several cards, then play your one card. You should <u>strive</u> to play your card in an even tempo with your other plays, avoiding any implication that you hold more than one (false and not ethical), or only one (true, stupid), card in that suit.

Same thing for a finessing situation. If Declarer leads the Jack towards Dummy's AQxx, do not make actions that imply that you have the King when you don't have it. For your own benefit, do not make actions that imply that you don't have it, either. What you should strive to do is to play your card in a <u>neutral</u> fashion that implies nothing about your holding. It is not ethical to deceive another player by the <u>manner</u> in which you play a card, and it is bad bridge to telegraph your true holding to an opponent.

Achieving 100% success with this concept is easier said than done (i.e., "It's Impossible." to quote the late, great bridge theoretician, Perry Como), but we must strive to do our best.

One tip I can share with you is: Think ahead. When Dummy is faced, Declarer should always pause for thought, and it is expected that both opponents are busy mentally processing the information gained from Dummy's cards. This is the time for Declarer and Defenders to make their plans, and also for Defenders to think ahead. E.g., "What do I do if Declarer leads the Jack towards AQxx?" If Declarer should happen to play very rapidly to Trick 1 (a violation of Rule #1), third hand should pause for thought, anyway.

The same concepts apply to bidding situations. Do not telegraph your holding to your Partner or the opponents by bidding quickly or slowly, and do not try to deceive by the manner of your bidding. Strive to keep an even tempo in your bidding. The definition of "an even tempo" changes when a jump bid is made in front of you. At that time, a pause is expected, whether the STOP card has been used or not, and whether or not you have a holding that needs time for thought. If your RHO opens 2 Spades, take 7 seconds or so to Pass, whether you hold a) xxx 10xx Jxx xxxx or b) Kx QJx Kxxx Qxxx. By the way, if you do anything other than Pass with hand b), your opponents may be about to liberally partake of Rule #2.

THE AGONY AND THE ECSTACY

Observations from the World Championships in Montreal by Karl Hicks

The Agony

Unfortunately, the World Championships were a disappointment in many ways.

- Travelling scores in all of the pair games with results out anywhere from one to three hours after a session ended. One pair did not get their scores for the first two qualifying rounds of the Mixed Pairs until the next day.
- The Rosenblum Teams (the premiere event) did not have screens in the round robin and each round was shuffle and play. Quite Neanderthal for an event whose entry was \$125.00 Canadian per session per team.
- 3. The Rosenblum setup was originally one group of 10 and 15 groups of 9 teams each playing an internal round-robin qualifying the top four teams for the round of 64. At game time it was discovered that six entries had been misplaced and that the number of youth team entries was too small to have a separate event so those teams were randomly dumped into each group as the number ten team. These included teams comprised of players from different countries which was contrary to the conditions of contest.
- 4. The top twenty teams were seeded according to World Master Point holdings. The arrangement was that if one of these teams qualified lower than their seeded position in their group,, they maintained their seed in the round of 64. Go figure.
- 5. Participants, upon registration received a leatherette case and name badge. There was a wine and cheese welcome session on the first Saturday and a closing banquet two weeks later. Otherwise, there was no hospitality.

The Ecstacy

On the plus side, it was a real thrill to play against good bridge players from around the world. We played teams from China, Poland, Sweden, France, Venezuela, India, the United States and Canada. Everyone was pleasant. Play started at 10 am and ended by 8 pm. Excellent!

Both hotels were a who's who of the world's best bridge players. I personally got to spend some time with a host of old friends including John Carruthers, Bruce Ferguson, Gus Duchene and Johnny Wiser to name a few. The Vu-graph sessions of the team finals and semis were excellent.

The city of Montreal is absolutely wonderful and the weather cooperated throughout so we were able to walk the city and avail ourselves of the numerous, excellent ethnic restaurants that contribute to Montreal's cosmopolitan, multicultural personality. Good weather, good bridge, good friends, good food and the beautiful city of Montreal contributed to an absolutely fantastic 16 days.

My conclusion: The WBF could take a lesson from the ACBL on how to run a bridge tournament.

The beauty and fascination of competitive bridge continues to enthrall millions of bridge players world-wide often in spite of the efforts of our elected and appointed representatives
