## WEAKER SEX ?

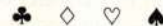

The Unit 230 Executive has ruled that women can no longer compete for the Springhill Trophy. Traditionally, competition for the Unit 194 Lagan Trophy and the Unit 230 Springhill Trophy has been open to players of both sexes, whereas the MacLeod and Callaghan Trophies are reserved for women only.

In a sense, I suppose one should applaud the Unit 230 decision. The former practice was both illogical and discriminatory. On the other hand, one has to wonder why we choose to perpetuate the practice of categorizing bridge players according to the composition of their chromosomes. Unfortunately, this dichotomy has always been such common practice that most of us no longer question the rationale behind it. Yet, if we pause for thought we can't get away from the fact that sexual segregation in bridge competition is sadly condescending and therefore humiliating for those who choose to take advantage of its benefits. And what are these benefits? Points, I'm told, opportunities, trophies.

Let's face it: the sex of a bridge player has nothing to do with his or her ability to play bridge. The tradition of classifying bridge events according to the sex of the competitors is an arbitrary, antiquated practice which should be abolished. Awarding special bridge trophies to women makes about as much sense as having special competitions for redheads, left-handers, homosexuals, or Icelandic immigrants.

## SMOKELESS



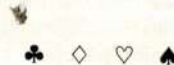
### TRURO SECTIONAL

## WHY THE MARITIMES WILL LOSE THE CAN-AT REGIONAL IN 1988

— An historical perspective by Bryan Rapson

Prior to 1967 the only Regionally-rated bridge tournament held east of Toronto was the CAN-AM Regional which alternated between Montreal and Ottawa. Due to the efforts of Maritimers J. E. Monaghan and T. Logan, the CAN-AM finally came to Halifax in 1967, the year that Montreal first hosted the ACBL Summer Nationals (now known as the North American Championships). The Halifax tournament was such a success that it was decided to hold an annual Regional in the Maritimes calling it the Canadian-Atlantic Regional. Thus the CAN-AT was born.

In 1972, the ACBL Units in New England, which formerly shared ACBL District 1 with the six ACBL Units in Eastern Canada, left District 1 to form the new ACBL District 25. This made District 1 an all-Canadian District extending from St. John's, Nfld. in the east, to Kingston, Ont. in the west. At that time, the number of red-point sessions available for Regional tournaments was determined by the McConnell-Rubin Formula. This formula was based on the area of the District and its ACBL membership. Unfortunately, in deciding the area to be assigned to our District, the ACBL excluded the northern half of the province of Quebec, all of Labrador and most of Newfoundland. The relatively small area assigned to District 1 coupled with a relatively small ACBL membership (under 400) resulted in our District only qualifying for 21 or 22 red-point sessions. For the first few years it was decided to divide 20 red-point sessions between a four-day Regional in Montreal, a three-day Regional in Ottawa and a three-day CAN-AT Regional in the Maritimes. The remaining one or two red-point sessions were accumulated for a fourth Regional tournament held in Quebec City in 1975.

Because of the proliferation of Regional tournaments in the early 1970's, the ACBL in 1977 offered Districts the option of holding three (and only three) Regionals annually of up to six days duration for a total of 36 red-point sessions. This was an offer that was too good for our District to refuse. However, it was recognized that there would be a major problem as to how to

occasionally schedule a Regional in Quebec City. This was finally resolved at the 1979 Annual Meeting of the District 1 organization known as the Eastern Canada Bridge Conference. Here, I would like to quote from the minutes of that meeting, which have led to so much heated discussions in the past year:

"On the matter of transferring a Regional to Quebec City, there was considerable reluctance on the part of the Maritimes, Acadian and Montreal Units to approve of a scheme to relinquish "their" regionals at any time, and opposition to any solution that would institutionalize such transfers. A compromise was reached to allocate the "Montreal" Regional of 1983 ( $\pm 1$  year) and the "Maritimes" Regional of 1987 ( $\pm 1$  year) to Quebec City (Hall/Tench), the Ottawa Unit having already contributed "their" 1979 Regional."

In 1982 District Director George Retek was able to persuade the ACBL Board of Directors to grant an ex-quota Regional to Quebec City to commemorate the 300th Anniversary of de LaSalle's voyage. This delayed the need for Montreal to give up its annual Regional until 1985 when Montreal hosted the Spring North American Championships of the ACBL, also a Senior Citizens' Regional in the Fall.

A special meeting of the E.C.B.C. held in Montreal in October 1986 confirmed that the Maritimes would have to give up the CAN-AT Regional to Quebec City in either 1988 or 1989, despite the strong protestations from Canadian Maritimes Unit President Vin Dohaney who pointed out that Maritimers would have to travel much greater distances to attend another Regional compared to Montreal and Ottawa players when they lose "their" Regional.

The Acadian Unit has decided to give up the CAN-AT in 1988 to allow Quebec City to continue holding a Regional at three-year intervals. In its place, the Acadian Unit is expected to host the first Maritimes Senior Citizens' Regional in 1988. The date and place have not yet been decided, but Charlottetown in October is rumoured.

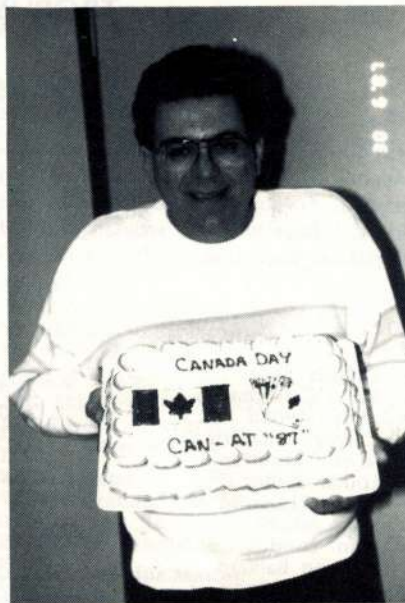

As the cards lie, seven clubs is cold since the spades come down and there are two club entries in the North hand. For some reason, very few pairs made the grand slam in clubs. Ian, our aspiring champion, reached the ambitious contract of 7 NT. A heart was led.

Now, after the ten of clubs falls on the first high club, the percentage play seems to enter dummy twice for two diamond finesses. But, no, Ian wasn't about to go for such pedestrian play. You see, when you are a champion—or an aspiring one—you make **winning** plays, not necessarily the **right** plays.

So, Ian won the ace of hearts, played

a high club to the nine in dummy. He then pitched a low diamond on the King of hearts, after which he ran all his clubs, severing communications with the nice spade suit in dummy. Poor West was eventually forced to bare his king of diamonds, desperately holding on to his QJ5 in spades. The writing was on the wall.

And here is a "You hold" story. You hold ♠98 ♥102 ♦976 ♣1098753. Lost interest? Well, look at the entire deal:

South is playing in seven hearts, and your partner leads the king of diamonds. He rattles off the ace of diamonds, four heart tricks and five spade tricks, ending in dummy with two small diamonds and the stiff ace of clubs. Now, if at any stage of the play you let go one of your "useless" diamonds, your opponent is desperately squeezed, which is what happened at a few tables.

Were you up to it? Or do you use hands like these to vegetate and prepare for "real" challenges?

# CANADIAN NATIONAL TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP, 1987

At the CNTC Final in Quebec City in June 1, I had the pleasure of being non-playing captain of the team made up by Russell Boyle, Earle Ferguson, Ron Mak, George Holland (replacing Kent Ritchie), Brian Alexander and George Caldwell. Non-playing captains are added to teams to care of administrative details, make overall team decisions (e.g. team lineups) and represent the team, so that players can concentrate on playing.

The local organizing committee provided excellent hospitality, ranging from a welcoming cocktail party to a suite where players could relax when they were sitting out, to driving yours truly to the railway station (20 minutes away) on very short notice.

Twenty teams played a round robin of 10 board matches using Victory Point scoring. Teams from the same region played each other first to avoid conflict of interest later in the event. After the round robin the top teams played a knockout to determine the winner.

Our team was in good shape after the first day in 7th place, had a bad second day and then won 4 of 6 matches on the last day to finish in the middle of the pack. The team beat some of the better teams including the eventual winners (Molson, Baran, Guoba, Carruthers and Murray) and

former Canadian champion Graves (with Mittelman, Kokish and Nagy,) and played the spoiler job well on the last day.

The other Maritime team, Al Millman, Eric Balkam, Gerry Callaghan, Bill Camp, Don Presse, John Stewart and Scott Symonds had a poor start being on the wrong end of a number of close matches. They finished strongly, winning 5 of 6 matches playing a deciding role in who qualified and placing ahead of our team by a slim margin. In the playoffs were Edgar (Toronto), Lloyd (Toronto/Montreal), Arbour (Vancouver/Montreal) and Molson (Montreal/Toronto). In the Finals Molson beat Edgar (last year's champions) by a slim margin.

Highlights were being part of the team (harmony, support, cameraderi, George Caldwell's philosophy, George Holland's "humour" (what's a "butcher"?), Quebec's restaurants, tennis before the game, post-game festivities and playing and sometimes beating the best in Canada. I was also impressed that although the stakes were high decorum was excellent and there were very few director calls.

I want to thank my teammates for the opportunity to be NPC and hope that our readers will have an opportunity to compete in this event or at least kibitz if and when the Maritimes get to host the CNTC.

## A TRIP TO MECCA

One of the signs of a true—not necessarily good—bridge player is his ability to rationalize, which is of course a nice way of referring to the act of kidding yourself. Among the most commonly used forms of rationalization is to blame your less than perfect performance at the bridge table on the company you keep; your lack of inspiration is the fault of the level of kitchen bridge at your local club; the predictably poor performance by your opponents only serves to reinforce **your** bad habits; these habits are carried over into real competition, which is one of the main reasons why you don't win at the Sectionals; if only you had some real, consistent competition . . . and the list goes on **ad nauseam**.

Gary and I were in a rut. The local travesty referred to as bridge was obviously ruining our game. We needed some **real** competition to get our act together. A trip to Halifax, bridge Mecca of the Maritimes, was obviously the only remedy. So, braving the "passable with caution" warnings on the radio, we took off to the big city.

The size of the field was impressive. Twenty tables. Wall-to-wall experts, representing thousands after thousands of masterpoints. This was the real thing.

Disillusionment came slowly. This was the clincher:

Of course, Gary has an automatic Valley double, but this is Halifax, remember, where bridge is bridge. So, four spades looks right. The lead, only a split second after the last pass, is the jack of clubs.

Hm, interesting. West obviously has a distributional monster, with eight hearts to the jack. If he doesn't have the king of spades he clearly has a long minor. Good thing he didn't lead a heart.

No sense finessing. The jack is most likely a singleton. So I go up ace and lead a low spade to my nine, just in case the spade split is unfriendly. If it loses to the jack, there is always the possibility of stiffing the king next. West wins with the jack. Unlucky. And now, West finds the dreaded heart return. Low from dummy and—lo and behold—**jack** of hearts from East. I do a double take as I win with my queen of hearts. West must have sorted wrong, or something. Anyway, I'm not complaining. I cash my ace of spades. Both follow: no king.

So, just to show these Halifax experts that they are not playing with kids, I cash my ace of hearts, crashing my king. East pitches a low diamond. And now I ruff my good ten of hearts with the queen of spades in dummy. My opponents don't seem, overly impressed with this clever play. What they don't know yet is that I've read the distribution like an open book. The hand is cold, since West must have the king of diamonds to justify his bidding. He obviously started with three spades to the K J, seven hearts, Kx of diamonds and the stiff jack of clubs. It is also clear that he either sorted wrong, taking the king of diamonds for his eighth heart, or perhaps he meant't to say two hearts instead of four.

("You, dear reader, are probably duly impressed with my penetrating analysis. You see, after I ruff the heart in dummy, I'll lead a low diamond to my jack. West wins and exits with a heart, I'll ruff, throw him in with a spade, ruff his heart return and reach this position:")

East is squeezed when I play my last spade, pitching the queen of clubs. Elementary, my dear Halifax hot shot. And, by the way, if West returns a diamond after winning the king of diamonds, a variation on the same squeeze theme arises. Like 1-ray vision, isn't it?)

But my dreams are shattered. West doesn't win my jack of diamonds with the king. He **ruffs** it with the king of spades! Hm, gutsy call, four hearts, with that ratty hand. Looks like the contract is doomed after the club return.

But what is this? West doesn't return the obvious club but a small **heart**, obviously still thinking he is playing with kids. Reading the hand like an open book, I ruff the heart and play the rest of my spades, reaching this position when I play my last spade and pitch a small club from dummy:

Poor East must either bare his king of diamonds or be thrown in with the king of

clubs to give me the remaining two diamond tricks.

As I exit with my club rather ostentatiously, preparing for the claim, West wins the king and claims the rest. Down two, vulnerable. When I recover consciousness I pick up the slip which reads nothing but pluses North-South, ranging from 620 to 1660.

The full deal:

It was a long trip back to the Valley.
